

The Pride of our Culture

“Repent for the kingdom of Heaven is at hand.” Our Lord gives this call as he begins his ministry of calling his disciples and calling the people back to the Lord. He comes to heal the woundedness of our nature, so that we can be free.

I wrote last Sunday that Christ comes to set us free by not only saving us from the effects of sin, but to help us avoid sin altogether. If you haven't read it yet, I encourage you to do so. In short, he seeks to heal and restore our wounded and fallen nature back to the original glory that he created Adam and Eve with. Our world and culture want to resist that call to repentance. Rather it wants to recreate or change the definition of what a human person is along with who Jesus is.

The change that our culture wants to make is to say that we do not have a “nature.” In other words, God did not create us a certain way that has set things which are good or harmful to us. Our culture says that I get to decide for myself what is good for me and what is harmful. It is ultimately the same pride that caused Adam and Eve to eat from the tree of knowledge in the garden. We have seen this play itself out in big ways recently by transgenderism, redefining marriage, and denying that life begins at conception. These are bigger manifestations of this idea, but it started more subtly. The way that this started was a denial of objective Truth in faith and morals. It was not stated that way, it was stated as “I decide what is true for me.” It is a sneaky trap of the evil one because it is a denial of Jesus' call to repentance. I decide what is true, so I do not have to conform my mind and heart to God's Truth. I will choose my own “truth.” This has been so much a part of our culture that it is in the very air that we breathe, but it is ultimately a trap. It denies the call for conversion in my life.

It also seeks to change who Jesus says that he is. It focuses on the parts of the gospel where Jesus welcomes all, seeks out the lost sheep, and proclaims God's abundant mercy. However, it ignores the other parts of the gospel that challenge us. Jesus also states that he will separate the sheep from the goats, wheat from the chaff, and that we must strive to enter through the narrow gate. Our world wants a Jesus who will not judge us or challenge us to strive for holiness.

We do not like repentance and conversion because it is difficult. Conversion requires us to change how we see the world, build different habits and patterns of life, and that is hard. We like stability and what we are used to, even if ‘our normal’ is harmful to us. This denial that I must conform my mind and life to God's Truth is a dangerous snare because our choices in the here and now form our eternal choice. Jesus' call to repentance is so we can share heaven with him in eternity and live free of our attachments to sin in this life.
