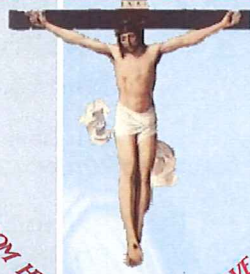

Give Us Our Daily Bread

The last couple of weeks, I have written on spiritual warfare. I have tried to unpack some of the ways that the evil one will attack us, and how we can try to avoid pitched battles. So, what role does prayer and our life of prayer, play into this spiritual warfare? This barely begins to scratch the surface, but here it goes.

If we continue with the warfare or battle imagery, then prayer becomes like our resupply point. It is the place that we go for rest, refueling, ammunition to fight with, and courage to reengage. When we pray, the Lord gives us his grace, which is him giving himself to us. That is where we receive all these things that we need. It is from our Father, who strengthens us.

These categories of prayer are not hard and fast, but helpful to describe different aspects of the spiritual life. I am going to separate this into sacraments (which are prayer and a source of grace) and personal prayer (devotion). BOTH ARE ESSENTIAL! Each one feeds and strengthens the other. However, I want to focus on personal prayer for the time being.

There are three types of prayer: vocal, meditative, and contemplative. Vocal prayer is reading or saying written prayers (Our Father, psalms, devotionals, etc.). Meditative prayer is taking a chunk of scripture or truth of the faith and mentally chewing on it. Imagine a cow chewing her cud, in other words, you are ruminating on scripture. Although in this instance, it has a positive context. (ex. "The Lord is my shepherd."- I may bring this line to mind and ponder, "when and how has the Lord shepherded me in the past." Then, I may tell Jesus thank you for some of these different moments where he has been present.) Contemplation is loving the Lord who is loving me. (ex. You see a couple who has been married for decades, and you see them communicating their love for one another as they look at each other. No words are spoken, nor are they needed. But this love is communicated between them clearly and intimately.) We use and can bounce between these three different types of prayer. All of them are meant to help us deepen and purify our relationship with the three persons of the Trinity.

When we pray "give us this day our daily bread," it both points to weekly Eucharist and our needed prayer time with God each day. The grace that we receive for the day is like the manna that the Israelites ate in the desert (Exodus 16). In short, God gives us enough for today. It is like these moments of time that you make for your spouse. Amid the chaos of family life, we carve out little moments so that our love for one another can continue to grow and deepen as the years go by.

When I say that prayer is the resupply point amidst the spiritual battleground. I am not meaning only reciting prayers nor am I saying that you must spend hours daily in intense contemplation of God's loving mercy. It is about finding ways that help you to deepen your love for the Lord daily by using different types of prayer. The key is consistency. Our prayer life is like a muscle; it takes a while to build it up. The more that we build up the habit of prayer the easier it becomes. A further resource to investigate are the works and writings of St. Josemaria Escriva. St. John Paul II called him the "saint of ordinary life" for his teachings that holiness is accessible to everyone through everyday tasks, not just for priests or religious orders. He is also the founder of Opus Dei.

Our life of prayer is our resupply point. It feeds and strengthens us for the journey. Sometimes, we may only have time for a quick Our Father to ask for help. Other times, we might take time in the tractor or on the road when we can ruminate on a scripture verse. These types and moments of prayer help to nourish our relationship with our loving Father.
