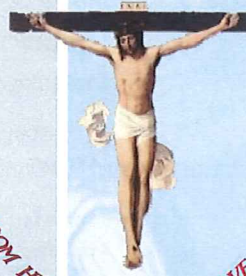

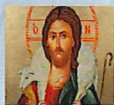

Sin misses the mark

One of the times that I got into trouble growing up was when I was practicing my archery as a kid. The problem was not that I was practicing; rather that I missed my target a few times. The result was that my misses had provided new ventilation for my father's shed. Oops! Suffice to say that missing the target caused harm, even if it was to the wall of a shed. Sin is like that. The root of the word sin was an early archery term which meant "to miss the mark." However, when people hear the word now, some may think of it merely as I broke one of the Church's rules.

When I wrote "Christ comes to set us free," I touched on how sin harms us because it is contrary to our nature. In short, sin is not just breaking one of the Church's rules, but it is an utterance, deed, or desire that is contrary to the eternal law. Since it misses the way that God created us and commanded us to live, that miss causes harm not only to us, but also those around us. I touched briefly in my last reflection, "Holy Communion" that mortal sin severs that communion with God. "Mortal sin destroys charity in the heart of man by a grave violation of God's law; it turns man away from God who is his ultimate end and his beatitude, by preferring an inferior good to him" (CCC 1855). It destroys charity in the heart of man because the theological virtue of charity (love) comes from God. So, if our relationship with him is severed, we cannot receive that love from him, and we cannot give what we do not have. Think of ourselves as a pool in a stream that the water flows through with God being the headwaters. When we commit a mortal sin, it is like a dam that blocks off the stream of God's gift of charity coming to us so the water flowing in and out of the pool dries up. When we go to confession the dam is removed, and the water can flow again.

When it comes to the gravity or seriousness of sin, there are two types: mortal and venial sin. Mortal is the most serious that cuts off our life with God, and brings death to our soul, which is why they are called mortal. Venial sins do not cut off our relationship with God, but they weaken that relationship. For a sin to be mortal, it must have all three conditions. It must be grave matter, we need to know that it is grave, and we freely choose to do it. If one of those three conditions is missing, it is still grave (serious) sin, but it is not mortal sin. When it comes to knowledge and consent, feigned ignorance and hardness of heart do not decrease our responsibility for those choices.

"Grave matter is specified by the Ten Commandments, corresponding to the answer of Jesus to the rich young man: 'Do not kill, Do not commit adultery, Do not steal, Do not bear false witness, Do not defraud, Honor your father and your mother.' One must also take into account who is wronged; violence against parents is in itself graver than violence against a stranger. (CCC 1858)"

Since, mortal sin cuts us off from God, how do we fix or restore that relationship. The main way is the sacrament of confession because we can be forgiven with either perfect or imperfect contrition (sorrow). Imperfect contrition is that I'm sorry because I fear eternal separation from God (hell) and other punishments that come from sin. It is also sometimes known as contrition of fear. Perfect contrition is contrition of charity because it arises from a love of God above all else.

While all sin "misses the mark," it is only mortal sins that sever our communion with God. Thankfully, our loving Father offers us the sacrament of confession which not only forgives us of all sin, but it also strengthens us from falling into mortal sin.
