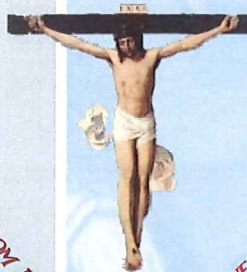

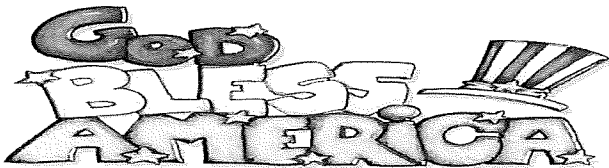

Receiving from the Lord

There is a pearl snap shirt in my closet that is very special to me. It does not look like much, but I received it when my grandfather passed away. It was one of his shirts that I inherited, and it brings up a lot of good memories whenever I see it. Maybe you have special things or mementos that bring up a certain reverence when you handle them.

I find the phrase, "Familiarity breeds contempt," to be a sobering reminder. The Eucharist which I am blessed to hold in my hands daily is of infinite value, and I need to be conscious of Who I am holding when I pray the mass. The Church states that we receive the Eucharist (rather than taking it) because it reminds us of this precious gift that we are given. Receiving instead of taking also reminds us that it is an unmerited, free gift that God gives himself to us in this way. The way that we receive is meant to be set apart from every other type of eating that we do. It is to help us to not become complacent or careless with this wonderful gift.

There are a number of ways that we may receive the Eucharist. We may receive either on the hands (emphasis on both hands) or on the tongue. We may also receive either standing or kneeling. Both options are perfectly acceptable so long as we are reverent and keep a couple of things in mind. It is whatever people prefer that helps them to recall the beautiful gift that this is. This week I want to focus on receiving on the hands, and next week I will focus on receiving on the tongue.

If you wish to receive on the hands, I invite you to keep a couple of things in mind so that we are as reverent as we can be. First, we make a throne with our hands. The non-dominant hand on is on top and our dominant hand on the bottom so that the priest or extraordinary minister can place Jesus on the palm of your top hand. Then you take your bottom hand, pick up the Eucharist, and put it in your mouth. Secondly, after you have consumed Jesus, I invite you to look at your palm to make sure that there are no crumbs from the Eucharist remaining on your hand or fingers. Since we believe that both the host and any visible fragments are all Jesus' body, we do not want to brush them off of our hands onto the floor where they may be stepped on. That is why you see me purify the sacred vessels after communion. I wash them with water and consume the water so that no fragment of the Lord's body or precious blood will remain in the chalice or paten. Think of your hands in the same way, please check to ensure that there are not particles that remain on your hands. Third, I would invite that if you come up to communion and you cannot receive with both hands to receive on the tongue. This helps to avoid the awkward maneuvering of our hand to get Jesus from the palm to our fingertips where he can be consumed. It also avoids the need to have to pop Jesus into our mouth with one hand similar to how we might take a pill. If you are unsure about receiving on the tongue, open your mouth wide, hold still and the extraordinary minister or I will place Jesus on your tongue.

This practice of treating the whole host and fragments with the reverence due to Jesus' body is also why we should never consume the Eucharist with gum in our mouth. It is because part of the host will get mixed in with the gum, so when we spit the gum into the trash, Jesus goes into the trash too.

That pearl snap shirt in my closet brings up a certain reverence because it means so much to me. We try to keep in mind the person we are receiving at mass so that we can show proper reverence. I don't want familiarity with receiving the Lord each week to bring about contempt nor complacency. This is a quote that I have seen some priests read before mass, "Priest of Jesus Christ celebrate this Holy Mass as if it were your first Mass, your last Mass, your only Mass."
