

Mercy and Repentance

“You gave your children good ground for hope that you would permit repentance for their sins” (Wis 12: 19). This is the closing line of our first reading, and it ties well with the gospel. In the gospel, we have the parable of the weeds in the wheat. The connection for both is that God is merciful, and he shows us that mercy by giving us time to repent of our sins here on earth.

If you want to confuse someone, tell them that hell was created out of God’s mercy. It is true. God created hell for those fallen angels and men who ultimately said that they will not serve God, they will only serve themselves. Heaven is being intimately united with God without end. God knows that this would be torture for those who reject him. Therefore, God created a place that is devoid of his presence which is hell. He also lets us choose by our actions whether we will serve him or only ourselves.

There is a great quote from Cardinal Sarah, “Don’t deceive people with the word, ‘mercy.’ God forgives sins only if we repent of them.” This runs counter to the way that mercy is often spoken of in the world. We speak of mercy as if it means that I can serve myself in this life and at the last moment say that I’m sorry and God will let me into heaven. If we do repent at the last moment, we will enter heaven, but what happens if we do not get that chance. When we say that God is merciful, it is because he has given us the gift of time on this earth to repent of our sinfulness. That when we become weeds, by mortal sin, he doesn’t destroy us immediately. Rather, he gives us time to repent and seek his forgiveness so that we may be transformed into wheat. When we are left to ourselves, we become weeds. The good news is that we have time, we have time to repent and turn away from our sins. However, there will come a point when we will stand before the Father and be judged. The wheat will enter heaven and the weeds will be eternally separated from God. This should not cause terror to us, but neither should we be nonchalant about it either.

Therefore, let us repent of our sinfulness and strive to enter through the narrow gate. Let us bring our sins and brokenness to confession and receive God’s mercy. Let us choose God so that when we stand before him, we can hear, “well done my good and faithful servant, come share your master’s joy.”

Year of Parish Revival (2023-2024): Jesus and the Eucharist Study

The *Jesus and the Eucharist* study has been created specifically for the Year of Parish Revival and is provided free of charge. This seven-session-study begins with the kerygmatic proclamation (Sessions 1-4) and builds to God's saving work in the Eucharist (Sessions 5-7).

Drawing from lesson content created by the Augustine Institute¹, the Revival team has expanded the study to include an opening message from a different (arch)bishop followed by *lectio divina* prayer with scripture. Lessons include testimonies from Catholics across the country, which then transition into small group discussions. Each session is two hours or less in duration with an emphasis on participant engagement.

Below is an overview of each session:

1. What's Our Story?

- The Bible is the story of God's love for us. It begins with him creating us out of love, redeeming us by love, and finally, transforming us in his love.

2. Who is Jesus?

- Jesus is both God and man, and therefore, reveals who God is in relation to us. Jesus asked Simon Peter, "Who do you say that I am?" (Matthew 16:15). He asks this same question of us: who do *you* say Jesus is?

3. Am I Saved?

- Salvation is a gift from God through Jesus Christ that requires our "yes".

4. Why a Church?

- Jesus didn't simply leave us a message or instruction manual to follow. He left us a living, dynamic Church where we can encounter him constantly and allow ourselves to be transformed into his likeness.

5. God is With Us

- God's presence in the Old Testament foreshadows the gifting of the Eucharist, one of the seven sacraments of the Church. Jesus establishes the Eucharist to give us strength for our journey, and to accompany us at every moment.

6. The Story of the Eucharist

- The story of the Eucharist is traced through Scripture - starting with Genesis and the Passover, through Jesus' miracles and teachings, the institution at the last supper, and the road to Emmaus. The cross is the new Tree of Life, and the Eucharist is its fruit.

7. Bread for the Journey

- The Eucharist sustains us on our spiritual journey. Our participation at Mass through the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist is our offering of thanksgiving to God, sending us forth to share what we have received.

We are now in The Parish Year of the Eucharistic Revival. Formation is one of four key pillars of this movement.

Attached is an outline of a study that will begin in mid-September. Take a look at the outline. I think you would agree that we need to get this content out there!

The Jesus and the Eucharist Study will consist of a series of videos followed by discussion. Several of our parishioners have volunteered to present the material and facilitate discussion in their homes or here at the Church. If you are contacted by one of these folks, please consider joining the study.

Lastly, if you would be interested in leading a small group of friends/neighbors, please call the office (605-842-3520). We could still use a couple more folks to lead groups. The content is "plug and play". Simply download the material and discussion sheets and have your meeting with your group.

Please prayerfully consider joining us and participating in this historical movement within Mother Church. I will be providing updates with other Eucharistic Revival opportunities throughout this year.

A vessel of God's grace

We are each asked to share God's love with others. How much we allow ourselves to be filled with God's grace will determine what we can share with others. We fill up with grace when we frequent the Sacraments, pray, and study our faith. After all, if we don't practice our own faith how can we help someone to become excited about theirs?

Our powerful Lord

In the Gospels, Jesus healed people 20 times. Seven times Jesus expelled demons. Three times He raised people from the dead, and eight other miracles showed His power over nature. With God all things are possible. All we have to do is ask in harmony with His will.

"My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior for He has looked with favor on his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed" (Luke 1:46-48).



Build up the Kingdom of God

As followers of Jesus, we're each called to take our place in the Kingdom of God and help build it up. Consider these suggestions to do your part:

Find your gifts: What special gifts do you possess? In addition to talents and skills, these can include wisdom from life experience or a particularly deep faith. Discern your gifts and ask God where

He wants you to use them.

Cultivate gratitude: Write down everything for which you are grateful in a "blessings list." Review it and add to it regularly, especially when tempted to jealousy or discouragement. Praise and thank God daily for whatever is on your list.

Practice humility: St. Thomas Aquinas

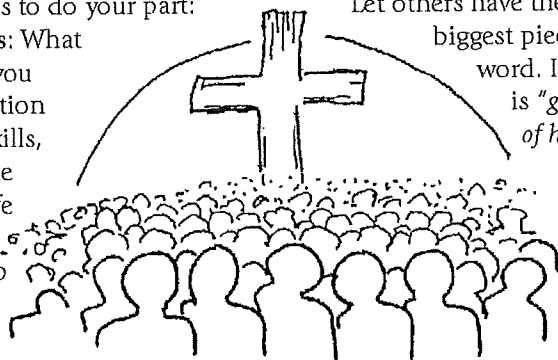
said, "Humility means seeing ourselves as God sees us: knowing every good we have comes from Him as pure gift."

Let others have the best place, the biggest piece of cake, the last word. Imitate Him who is "gentle and humble of heart" (Matthew 11:29).

Be ready to serve: Any act of service can build up your parish, neighborhood, or community. Small

or great, everyone can contribute something. Give of yourself.

Strive for the higher gifts: Jesus asked every one of us to love God and each other. Without love, St. Paul said, "I gain nothing" (1 Corinthians 13:3). If you have true charity, you're on the right track.



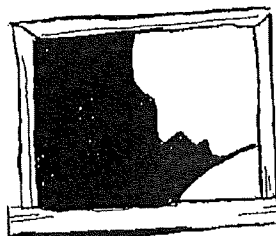
Why Do Catholics Do That?

On Easter Sunday, Jesus appeared to the Apostles in the Upper Room and said, "Peace be with you" (John 20:19). He breathed on them, saying, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them and whose

sins you retain, they are retained" (John 20:22-23).

With that, Jesus established an efficacious way to dispense forgiveness of our sins. He knew we'd need to be assured of His forgiveness by personally hearing the words, "I absolve you of your sins."



"Go and make disciples"

We're all called to spread the Gospel as missionaries (Mark 16:15), but not everyone is required to travel. As a Carmelite nun, St. Therèse of Lisieux lived out her "second calling" to be a missionary. Here are three ways to spread the Gospel within any vocation:

Go deeper in your faith. You can't share what you don't have. St. Therèse developed her "Little Way" of holiness after years of prayer and study. Step deeper into your faith daily: read a section of the Catechism, pray over a verse of Scripture, listen to a

Catholic podcast while driving or walking, pray.

Adopt-a-missionary: St. Therèse was a "spiritual sister" to several missionaries, writing them letters and supporting them in prayer, indirectly helping hundreds of souls. Adopt a missionary – or anyone who shares the Faith. Contact your parish or diocese for suggestions.

"Intercession fueled by charity": St. Therèse lovingly offered to God the "thorns" she received from others – discomforts, misunderstandings, hurt feelings – to win souls for Christ. Offer your "thorns" as saving graces.



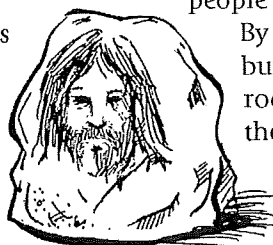

Matthew 16:13-20, The "Rock-solid" foundation

The events in this passage lay the foundations for the Catholic Church. In it, Jesus asks His disciples, "Who do you say that I am?" It was a question about Jesus' identity, rather than about the persuasiveness of His teaching or His popularity. The heart of Catholicism centers around the truth of who Jesus is.

Inspired by the Holy Spirit, Simon answers for the group, identifying Jesus as the Son of God, the Messiah (Matthew 16:17). Jesus proclaims this was divinely revealed to Simon and changes his name to Peter

("Rock"). Jesus gives him the keys to the kingdom, giving Peter (and his successors) the authority to interpret Scripture, forgive sins, and admit people into the Church.



By this, Jesus signaled He was building His Church on a rock-solid foundation – on the confession of Peter about Jesus' divinity. This truth has been handed down through the ages, from the Apostles to the bishops to us. The Holy Spirit would lead Peter – and his successors, the popes – to continue speaking and acting in truth as the visible head of the Church.

Q & A How can I avoid gossiping?

Chatting with friends can become gossip – unfairly disclosing another's faults or sins without a valid reason, to people who don't know them (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, #2477). Try these ideas when chatting becomes gossip:

Name it: A gentle reminder between friends is an act of kindness. Try, "I think we're edging into gossip," or "Oh, that's not kind!" It's better to risk speaking up than silently allowing sin.

Redirect the conversation: Highlight good qualities of the person about whom others are gossiping. Refocus on inspiring news, a good book you read – anything else that is "honorable ... just ... pure ... pleasing" (Philippians 4:8).

Leave: If nothing else works, excuse yourself and leave the conversation. You'll avoid becoming complicit to sin and wordlessly communicate that you find gossip unacceptable.

Pray: Sins of the tongue (gossip, slander, calumny, detraction) are serious and require grace to resist. Invoke the Holy Spirit for yourself, for those who engage in gossip, and especially for those harmed by it.

Feasts & Celebrations

August 6 – Transfiguration of the Lord. Christ appeared in glory in the company of Moses and Elijah, discussing the Passion (Luke 9:30-31), and a voice was heard to say, "This is my beloved son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him" (Matthew 17:5).

August 14 – St. Maximilian Mary Kolbe (1941). A Polish Franciscan, St. Maximilian was imprisoned at Auschwitz. When the jailers chose ten people to execute, he substituted himself for a man with a family. He was honored as a "martyr of charity" by

Pope John Paul II.

August 23 – St. Rose of Lima (1617). Born in colonial Peru, Rose worked constantly to help her poverty-stricken family. She became a lay Dominican, and cared for homeless children, the elderly, and the sick in her house.

August 29 – Passion of St. John the Baptist (1st century). St. John the Baptist courageously spoke the truth to the leaders of his time, making him powerful enemies. He was arrested by Herod and martyred (Mark 6:17-29).
